

Youth Communiqué 9 July 2025, Nairobi, Kenya

Excellencies,

We, the young people gathered here in Kenya, present this communiqué with our aspirations – and our trust in global leaders to rise to this decisive moment for climate action and adaptation.

Many of us participated in the GCA Youth Academy on Adaptation and Leadership last year, gaining knowledge and skills to lead change. As Kenyans, we are proud that one youth organization from every African country will join a Train-the-Trainers program here in Nairobi in September 2025.

We are also proud to organize the Youth Adaptation Forum in Kenya on 5 September. The outcomes will be presented at COP30.

Excellencies,

We call on major emitters to stay true to the promises made under the Paris Agreement. There is no time left for delay or backsliding.

We urge all high-emitting countries to urgently scale up action on mitigation, deliver on climate finance commitments, and support a fair and equitable transition away from fossil fuels.

The year 2025 is crucial. Governments must show bold ambition through enhanced Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) and National Adaptation Plans (NAPs). These policies must recognize the power and potential of youth to lead resilient futures.

We emphasize that meeting the Global Goal on Adaptation is not optional, it is essential for the survival, dignity, and future of millions on the frontlines of the climate crisis.

We call for urgent and sustained action in the following priority areas:

1. Education and Capacity Building

Equip youth with the knowledge, tools, and opportunities to lead climate adaptation and resilience at all levels.

2. Creation of Green and Resilient Jobs

Invest in climate-smart employment — especially in sustainable agriculture, agro-business, and adaptation-focused entrepreneurship.

3. Nature-based Solutions

Promote and invest in solutions that work with nature – from restoring ecosystems to protecting water resources and enhancing biodiversity.



4. Local and Indigenous Knowledge

Recognize and integrate indigenous and traditional knowledge in climate policies and practices, ensuring they guide community-led adaptation.

5. Meaningful Youth Participation

Ensure young people are included not only in consultation, but in decision-making and implementation – as full partners in adaptation action.

6. Empowerment of Young Women

Support and amplify the leadership of young women in climate action, ensuring gender-responsive policies and equal access to opportunities.

7. Increased Finance for Adaptation

Mobilize accessible, predictable, and youth-inclusive finance to support locally led and youth-led adaptation initiatives.

8. Youth-Led, Locally-Led Adaptation

Support and scale innovative, youth-led adaptation solutions rooted in local knowledge, needs, and contexts.

We proudly acknowledge the role of the Global Center on Adaptation (GCA) in strengthening youthled adaptation across Africa.

We call for the continuation and expansion of the African Adaptation Acceleration Program (AAAP) to support youth-led adaptation in its next phase.

We call for meaningful support and resources for vulnerable countries and communities to adapt and thrive in the face of worsening climate impacts.

Our generation will inherit the consequences of today's decisions.

We demand accountability, ambition, and solidarity.
