BACKGROUND OF THE YOUTH LEADERSHIP AND EDUCATION PROGRAM

A million young people urge governments to prioritise climate crisis

World leaders will meet for Climate Adaptation Summit to consider how to adapt to extreme weather

More than 1 million young people around the world have urged governments to prioritise measures to protect against the ravages of climate breakdown during the recovery from the Covid-19 pandemic.

Young people comprise 1.21 billion of the world's population,² the largest youth population in history. Young people are disproportionately vulnerable to the climate crisis. In many developing countries, climate shocks disrupt schooling, threaten health, and erode livelihoods, compounding existing social and economic barriers. Meaningful youth participation in adaptation dialogues is therefore essential to designing measures that are inclusive, equitable, and effective.

With the intensifying effects of climate change, such as increasing extreme weather events, young people around the world are calling for governments and decision-makers to prioritize the climate crisis and the inclusion of young people in designing and implementing adaptation measures.³

Over the last five years, the Youth Leadership and Education Program has worked to advance youth participation and engagement with climate adaptation across Africa and around the world. Based upon the mandate of a Global Call to Action developed by young people, the Program focused on youth participation in climate policy and empowering young people to design and implement adaptation solutions.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS: FROM THE CALL TO ACTION TO TODAY

The Global Youth Call to Action

In 2021, during the COVID-19 pandemic, GCA's YAN facilitated 15 global and regional consultations to collate input from young people in 120 countries across the globe. The results of these consultations led to the Global Youth Call to Action on Adaptation. Young people called upon governments and stakeholders to implement the Global Youth Call to Action on Adaptation in addition to the mitigation measures already in place.






The Global Call to Action highlighted the need for:

- 1 Raising awareness on adaptation to climate change.
- 2 Promoting universal education, training, and skills development to empower younger generations to adapt to the impacts of climate change.
- 3 Fostering youth participation in the implementation of the Paris Agreement on Climate Change and the Sustainable Development Goals.
- 4 Accelerating adaptation implementation and scaling of climate resilient solutions.
- 5 Expanding economic opportunities for youth, adaptation jobs, and youth-led businesses.
- 6 Strengthening the youth leadership of girls, young women, Indigenous youth, young farmers, and the most vulnerable youth.

As a result of the Global Call to Action, the four pillars of the Youth Leadership and Education Program were formed. These are:



These four pillars have guided the work of the Youth Leadership and Education Program, whilst ensuring that all the demands from the Global Call to Actionhave been met.

YOUTH ADAPTATION NETWORK

In 2020, GCA observed a gap: few youth networks were actively engaged in climate **adaptation**. International youth efforts tended to focus elsewhere, leaving adaptation underrepresented. In response, GCA established the YAN.

The YAN is an umbrella platform that engages, empowers, and amplifies young people in the adaptation agenda. It provides access to adaptation knowledge and campaigning materials and connects youth with leaders and businesses driving the global climate response. By treating young people as equal stakeholders and offering practical learning opportunities, the Network helps translate knowledge into action, supporting meaningful youth participation in adaptation.

Global Youth Adaptation Network

The YAN was launched in Bangladesh on 8 September 2020 by H.E. Saima Wajed Hossain, Ambassador for Vulnerability for the Climate Vulnerable Forum (CVF). The YAN further developed these insights to form a Global Youth Call to Action on Adaptation, a set of key demands and actions from young people to decision-makers. The Global Call was published in January 2021 and presented to Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon and other global leaders at the Adaptation Summit.

The YAN aims to:



Connect young people and youth organizations to build the youth adaptation movement.



Empower youth to lead and drive effective climate adaptation action.



Ensure youth voices are central to climate decision-making.

African Youth Adaptation Network

In 2025, GCA amplified the world's largest YAN across Africa to build the African YAN. A call was made to select one youth-led organization per African country as the In-Country Focal Point for the African YAN.



YOUTH ADAPTATION FORUMS



Young people are at the forefront of the climate crisis. Whilst they are disproportionately affected by the impact of the climate crisis, they are leading in developing innovative solutions and implementing adaptation measures. It has been demonstrated that building upon youth-led movements and incorporating the knowledge and lived experiences of young people can accelerate the design and implementation of locally led climate-resilient solutions, as well as raise awareness of climate issues and influence climate policies.

Over the last five years, GCA has organized a number of Youth Adaptation Forums with the aim to connect the young people who are driving the adaptation agenda. The Youth Adaptation Forums provide an opportunity to engage in knowledge transfer, share good practices across continents, and build connections in climate adaptation. During the COVID-19 Pandemic, these started as Virtual Youth Adaptation Forums. Over time, the Forums evolved into Regional, Thematic, and In-Person African Youth Adaptation Forums.

Throughout 2022, GCA organized seven regional Youth Adaptation Forums. The Forums took place in hybrid and virtual formats, engaging youth around the globe. The Youth Adaptation Forums aimed to elevate youth voices and increase the influence of young people worldwide on the adaptation agenda. Each Forum consulted the youth participants on their priorities, challenges, and needs on the Global Goal on Adaptation.

African countries The Forums focused on engaging young people about adaptation policies, including NAPs, the Global Goal on Adaptation, and the Global Stocktake, as well as showcasing youth-led adaptation solutions. The main objectives were to

- Promote the perspectives of young people in adaptation policies, including the Global Goal on Adaptation and NAPs to advance inclusive and equitable adaptation decision-making and action by bringing together experts, policymakers, and young people.
- Catalyze innovative ideas and adaptation action in young people by featuring African youth leadership around the world, including the African YouthADAPT winners.
- Establish and strengthen regional connections between young people and youth organizations to scale adaptation actions and strengthen young people's adaptation advocacy activities by uniting young people for the adaptation agenda.

Thematic Youth Adaptation Forums

In 2024, GCA organized six Youth Adaptation Forums.

The Youth Adaptation Forums focused on Young Women Leadership, Water, Climate-Resilient Agriculture, Nature-Based Solutions, Youth Entrepreneurship and Jobs, and Locally Led Adaptation. The forums sought to collect good-practice adaptation solutions from around the world, with a special focus on Africa, and influence adaptation policies that are related to the thematic priority areas, which were identified in the Regional Youth Adaptation Forums.

The thematic Youth Adaptation Forums aimed to



Boost global interest and knowledge of young people about climate adaptation



Inspire young people to take climate adaptation action



Spotlight young people's priorities on adaptation for policy engagement and adaptation action.

By diving deeper into each identified theme, the forums mobilized young people to take and initiate adaptation action at a local level ahead of the global Youth Climate Adaptation Action Day 2024. The outcomes of the forums were shared during COP29 in Baku.

In-Person African Youth Adaptation Forums

In 2025 in the lead up to COP30, GCA, in partnership with local youth organizations, organized **In-Person African Youth Adaptation Forums 2025** to build a network of youth engaged with adaptation and spotlight youth-led adaptation solutions across different regions of Africa.

The Forums brought together students, youth-led organizations, universities, government representatives, and adaptation experts to engage in an adaptation exchange. Young people had the opportunity to share best practices, their needs for building a climate-resilient future, and recommendations for governments and decision-makers. Each forum engaged a geographically diverse demographic of youth from within the country, bringing representatives from different regions.

Each forum developed Youth Communiqué, highlighting the needs and recommendations of young people, which were presented at GCA's AAAP Partnership Forums.

YOUTH ADVISORY PANELS



The CEO's Youth Advisory Panel was first established under Professor Patrick V. Verkooijen at COP26 in Glasgow, with the goal of strengthening youth engagement in the global adaptation agenda. At the same climate summit, world leaders committed to doubling adaptation finance to developing countries by 2025.

Since its inception, the panel has played a vital role in amplifying youth voices in climate adaptation. The 2022 and 2023 panels worked closely with GCA colleagues to mobilize over 13,500 young people globally through 12

regional Youth Adaptation Forums, forming the backbone of GCA's flagship youth consultation process.

Building on this momentum, the 2024 panel expanded its reach, engaging 15,300 young people through six thematic Youth Adaptation Forums. It also took on a significant advocacy role in Youth Climate Adaptation Action Day, organizing Lighthouse Events and developing a petition urging global leaders at COP29 to strengthen their commitment to adaptation finance.

Each year, the CEO's Youth Advisory Panel continues to grow its impact, empowering young leaders to shape the future of climate adaptation.

HIGH-LEVEL INTERGENERATIONAL DIALOGUES AND CONSULTATIONS

Over the past five years, GCA has convened high-level Intergenerational Dialogues to connect young leaders with decision-makers. These forums accelerate adaptation action by showcasing youth-led solutions in entrepreneurship, advocacy, and policy, and by elevating concrete youth recommendations to shape the international adaptation agenda.

Through formats such as Written Communiqués and Calls to Action, young people present their needs and proposals directly to senior leaders, who respond and engage in open dialogue. The result is a practical bridge between generations—and a real seat at the decision-making table for youth.

YOUNG WOMEN LEADERSHIP

Over the past 20 years, the number of climate-related disasters has almost doubled. These climate-related disasters exacerbate existing gender inequalities in society, leaving women and girls to bear the brunt of the climate crisis disproportionately. Climate change could push almost 236 million more women and girls into a situation of food scarcity, compared to 131 million men and boys. 6

Despite being disproportionately affected by climate change, women remain underrepresented in policy and decision-making processes and often have limited control over their livelihoods. These structural barriers restrict their access to the resources, finance, and opportunities needed to adapt effectively to a changing climate.

In 2021, GCA and the Ban Ki-moon Center for Global Citizens joined forces to contribute to implementing the AAAP and Youth Leadership and Education in Africa by piloting the Online Executive Training – Young Women Leadership on Climate Adaptation. This virtual educational and capacity-building program sought to empower young African women to unleash their full potential and capabilities to contribute to and drive climate change adaptation solutions. The Online Executive Training Course aimed to provide:



Leadership Capacity Building: Enhance leadership skills to effectively lead and advocate for sustainable solutions in the

face of climate change.


Youth participation in decision-making processes is fundamental. Currently, this generation of young people is the largest in history, with 1.21 billion individuals aged 15–24 alive today.⁷ Approximately 87% of these young people live in developing countries,⁷ which are the most vulnerable to the impacts of climate change.

As the generation that will inherit both the planet and the impacts of climate change, young people must be meaningfully involved in designing and delivering adaptation policies — especially NAPs — to spur innovative, climate-resilient solutions. While references to youth in NAPs have grown, their participation is often limited to areas like education, capacity-building, job creation, and

communication. Significant gaps remain: young people are still largely excluded from core phases such as decision-making, co-design, knowledge sharing, and monitoring and evaluation of NAPs. Meaningful youth participation across the full policy cycle is essential.

GCA has been working with the UNFCCC Least Developed Countries Expert Group (LEG) and governments to promote youth participation in the NAP Expo. Through consultations, GCA has fostered dialogue surrounding examples of good practices of youth engagement with NAPs from design to implementation, allowing governments to engage in a knowledge transfer on how best to facilitate youth participation in NAPs.

YOUTH ACADEMY ON CLIMATE ADAPTATION AND LEADERSHIP



A core pillar of GCA is universal education on climate adaptation. Education is both heavily affected by the climate crisis and central to the solution. Each year, the learning of an estimated 38 million young people is disrupted by climate-related events.¹³ At the same time, higher levels of education are strongly correlated with greater adaptive capacity and resilience to climate change.¹⁴

In response to the global call to action and in order to increase knowledge, develop skills, and build capacity of young people, GCA has created different educational resources relating to youth leadership and adaptation. Among these the training-of-trainers model, which was piloted in Kenya and is to be replicated across Africa, is a tool to equip young people with the skills to adapt to the changing climate.

To strengthen adaptation education, GCA has developed a:

Toolkit for Youth on Adaptation and Leadership

In response to the global call to action on Adaptation, GCA launched the Toolkit for Youth on Adaptation and Leadership in 2023. The Toolkit for Youth on Adaptation and Leadership aims to equip young people with the knowledge and skills to engage in climate adaptation policy, advocacy, and action. It is a tool for universal education on climate adaptation to enable all young people to have access to information on climate adaptation. To ensure the Toolkit is reflective of the different realities across Africa, it was developed in partnership with 40 youth organizations from across the African continent and responds directly to the needs and recommendations of young people. The Toolkit is available in French, English, and Arabic.

The modules include:

- 1. Understand Climate Change
- 2. Understand the Basics of Vulnerability and Climate Change Adaptation
- 3. Understand Vulnerable Groups and Climate Adaptation Planning
- 4. Learn Youth-Led Climate Adaptation Solutions
- 5. Develop Soft Skills for Youth Leadership in Adaptation
- 6. Engage Climate Adaptation Policies: Local, National, and International
- 7. Design Adaptation Advocacy Strategy
- 8. Design Adaptation Action

Pilot Youth Academy on Climate Adaptation and Leadership



Building on the Toolkit for Youth on Adaptation and Leadership, GCA developed a training-of-trainers model to be replicated across Africa. The model incorporates workshops on personal skills development, effective communication, and training techniques, to strengthen the capacity of participants to share their knowledge and skills with others.

From 18th to 26th September 2024, GCA partnered with the University of Nairobi and the University of Groningen to develop and execute the inaugural Youth Academy on Climate Adaptation and Leadership at the University of Nairobi's main campus. This training program aimed to equip young people in Kenya and across Africa with the skills to become climate adaptation leaders and trainers in their communities.





Pan-African Youth Academy on Climate Adaptation and Leadership



In 2025, GCA built upon the success of the Pilot Youth Academy on Climate Adaptation and Leadership and hosted the Pan-African Youth Academy on Climate Adaptation and Leadership. The Pan-Africa Academy is a **training-of-trainers program** designed to equip participants with the skills and knowledge to replicate climate adaptation training in their home countries. It was co-organized by GCA, the Kenya School of Government, the University of Nairobi, the University of Groningen, and the MMUST.



The Youth Academy on Climate Adaptation and Leadership features modules and lectures by leading professors and experts, equipping participants with the skills to multiply impact across Africa and beyond.

Scaling Up Adaptation Training in Africa

To facilitate the replication of the Youth Academy, GCA, in partnership with MMUST, awarded 15 small grants. Alongside the small grants, the youth organizations receive coaching to replicate the training within their communities.

The Small Grants initiative, launched by GCA, aims to strengthen the capacity of youth organizations across Africa to replicate and scale the Youth Academy model using the GCA Youth Adaptation Toolkit. Youth groups from 37 countries participated in a competitive application process, from which 15 organizations were selected to receive €2,000 grants each.

The funded projects primarily focus on in-person training on climate adaptation, empowering young people to design and implement context-specific solutions to local climate challenges, with some incorporating online follow-up sessions to enhance engagement and continuity. This initiative not only supports the replication of the Youth Academy model but also nurtures a continent-wide network of youth-led adaptation champions driving locally led climate action.

MMUST has been providing one-on-one coaching and technical mentorship to guide grantees throughout the replication process, from understanding and contextualizing the GCA Toolkit to developing proposals, aligning budgets with project activities, implementing training, and reporting on outcomes. This tailored coaching approach has strengthened the organization's capacity in

project design, facilitation, monitoring, and documentation while fostering collaboration, accountability, and knowledge sharing. As a result, youth groups are now better equipped to sustain and scale locally led climate adaptation initiatives within their respective communities. This approach has proven to strike the right chord in meeting the needs of young people for climate adaptation knowledge and skills, demonstrating a scalable and replicable model that positions young Africans at the forefront of climate action. The demonstrated impact and growing demand from youth organizations across the continent make a compelling case for sustained investment in this initiative. This initiative promises exponential returns as these empowered youth leaders transform climate discourse into tangible, communitydriven solutions that will shape Africa's climate-resilient future.

In 2023, at COP28 in Dubai, Prof. Patrick V. Verkooijen announced that GCA will host the "Youth Climate Adaptation Action Day," which will mobilize young people from across the world and bring together local adaptation actions to create one global movement. The purpose of the Day is to bring young people together in a knowledge exchange to implement adaptation solutions that will accelerate adaptation action. Young people from around the world were invited to join the global movement to engage with climate adaptation actions and accelerate adaptation solutions worldwide.

The Youth Climate Adaptation Action Day responds to GCA's global call to action to raise awareness on climate adaptation and to accelerate adaptation worldwide. The mass mobilization of young people acts as a reminder that youth are leading the adaptation agenda.

The Youth Climate Adaptation Action Day aims to:

- 1 Build the youth adaptation movement with schools, universities, and youth organizations.
- 2 Raise awareness and increase the knowledge of young people on climate adaptation.
- 3 Drive knowledge sharing for youth-led adaptation actions in Africa and around the world.

2024 Youth Climate Adaptation Action Day

In 2024, the inaugural Youth Climate Adaptation Action Day was opened at Tsinghua University with the High-Level Anchoring Event. Using the 'follow the Sun' approach, young people, schools, universities, partner networks and youth-led organizations hosted **Youth Climate Adaptation Lighthouse Events** in 73 countries. The Day culminated with a closing event at the University of Groningen. Youth Climate Adaptation Lighthouse Events (Lighthouse Events) are virtual or in-person events aimed at raising awareness on climate adaptation, showcasing adaptation solutions, connecting young people, and inspiring action on climate adaptation.

2025 Youth Climate **Adaptation Action Day**

In 2025, the Youth Climate Adaptation Action Day invited young people, youth-led organizations, students, and grassroots groups to organize consultations on NDCs, NAPs, youth, and adaptation. NDCs are plans submitted by countries under the Paris Agreement outlining their climate action goals. The theme of "NDCs, NAPs, Youth, and Adaptation" emphasizes the role young people play in building resilient economies and achieving these national commitments.
